From the Pastor: The Unity of the Church

NOVEMBER 2020

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The unimaginable thing about Jesus is what He does, what He accomplishes, and what He gives to His Church. These are the things that logic and reason can't comprehend because they are outside of us. They are the 1 + 1 + 1 = 1 type things of the Trinity: things beyond our human understanding. They are the things of bread that is still bread and yet the flesh of the living God and wine that is still wine and yet the blood poured out for us on the cross. They are the things of baptism that washes away sin and buries us in the tomb with Jesus, only to be raised in newness of life as He bursts forth from the grave. They are the things too irrational to be real and yet are real because God says so. His Word creates reality just like it created everything in all the universe. And it doesn't matter if we don't "get" it. It doesn't matter if we can't fully comprehend it. It doesn't matter if our feelings and emotions tell us different. All of these things are true because God promises them to be true. And so they are: True, true for you and me and all the Church!

And so here we sit, on this earth. And everything screams at us that there is a chasm, a separation, between us and God. By faith we know that that is not true, but are brains and our emotions want to tell us something different. ... But there is no separation with God. We have what the Church Triumphant in heaven has. We have Jesus, right here and right now. He gives Himself to us. You are one with Christ! That is what the Lord's Supper gives to you, to the Church, to Christ's body. No separation, no relationship, only true unity, a oneness unlike anything else in all of creation. Here you partake of the foretaste of the feast to come: a feast of Christ's body broken for you, a feast of His blood poured out for you. ... This feast makes you one with God and one with each other. It unifies the Church as His body, with Christ Jesus as the head. No separation. Just unity! ... What the Church Triumphant has, so does the Church Militant.

That is why the liturgy that we say and sing and pray together is so amazing. We get to sing the very song that the saints in heaven sing before the throne of God. "Blessing and honor and wisdom of strength, be to God and the Lamb, forever, amen!" Those words we sing are ripped right out of Revelation, and they are the very words that John heard the Church in heaven singing before the throne of the Lamb. Their words are our words. Their song is our song!

But it is so much more than that we are just copying their words. Jesus unifies His Church. Not just the Church here on earth, but the Church in heaven as well! The Church is not separated. There are not two different Churches. There is only one Church, The Church, The Body of Christ. It matters not where that Church is, it only matters where Jesus is. And if Jesus is here, which He really and truly is, and if He is in heaven with the all the saints who have died in the faith, and if His presence makes the Church one with Him then it also makes it one with itself! The saints in heaven are one with the saints on earth; one with the saints of Wheat Ridge Evangelical Lutheran. ... How is this possible? ... Because Christ our Lord says it is!

All unwrapped gifts are to be returned to the church by Sunday, December 6th. Year after year the staff at Family Tree find that the teenagers receive minimal support. Everyone likes babies and small children. Our members decided that we would take on the gifting for the teenagers. On the Angel Tree will be specific items to buy. As you know, teenagers like and need to "fit in"-- thus a very specific list has been given to us. They normally help 200 families during the holidays. Thank you in advance for your support!

Family Tree's Mission Statement:

To help people overcome child abuse, domestic violence and homelessness to become safe strong and self-reliant.

"Family Tree works with vulnerable populations located in the seven-county Denver metro region. Clients have a history of poverty, trauma and/or crisis and internal data identifies the most common client demographic across all programs are family units. We have a total of 10 integrated programs that provide individualized support to help move a client toward self-sufficiency and economic success.

We also have an educational component aimed at prevention. Our Domestic Violence Outreach group works with teens to help them understand what a good relationship looks like, and our Safecare program trains parents of 0-5 year olds in the areas of parenting, child safety, and child health. Other programs offer financial classes, parenting classes, case management, counseling, employment help etc.

Lastly we have Treasure Trunk, our thrift store that distributes goods free of charge to our clients but the public can purchase items and that money rolls back into Family Tree. We really appreciate Wheat Ridge Lutheran Church's on-going support. THANK YOU"

Church Library News


The following acquisitions have recently been prepared for checkout in the Library.

What We Believe—Augsburg Confession

Article XV—Church Ceremonies

Note: Lutheranism embraces the good historic traditions of the Church, especially those of the Western Church. These include such things as following the pattern of the Church year, lectionary readings from the Bible, a liturgical order of worship, various festival days, vestments worn by clergy, and the use of candles, crucifixes, and other objects. As this article makes very clear, in the Lutheran Church, rites, decorations, or traditions are never used or followed to appease God's wrath or to earn the forgiveness of sins. Lutheranism removed from the Church useless and harmful traditions such as monastic vows and inviting on certain foods on certain days.. (See also AP XV; SA III XV; FC Ep X and SD X.)

Our churches teach that ceremonies ought to be observed that may be observed without sin. Also, ceremonies and other practices that are profitable for tranquility and good order in the Church (in particular, holy days, festivals, and the like) ought to be observed.

Yet, the people are taught that consciences are not to be burdened as though observing such things was necessary for salvation [Colossians 2:16-17]. They are also thought that human traditions instituted to make atonement with God, to merit grace, and to make satisfaction for sins are opposed to the Gospel and the doctrine of faith. So vows and traditions concerning meats and days, and so forth, instituted to merit grace and to make satisfaction for sins, are useless and contrary to the Gospel.

Something Worth Reading

"What Is Marriage? Man Woman: A Defense"-Sherif Girgis, Ryan T Anderson, Robert George

Marriage is, of its essence, a comprehensive union: a union of will (by consent) and body (by sexual union; inherently ordered to procreation and thus the broad sharing of family life; and calling for permanent and exclusive commitment, whatever the spouses' preferences. It has long been and remains a personal and social reality, sought and prized by individuals, couples, and whole societies. But it is also a moral reality: a human good with an objective structure, which it is inherently good for us to live out.

Marriages have always been the main and most effective means of rearing healthy, happy, and wellintegrated children. The health and order of society depend on the rearing of healthy, happy, and wellintegrated children. That is why law, though it may take no notice of ordinary friendships, should recognize and support marriages.

There can thus be no right for non-marital relationships to be recognized *as marriages*. There can indeed be much harm, if recognizing them would obscure the shape, and so weaken the special norms, of an institution on which social order depends. So it is not the conferral of benefits on same-sex relationships itself but *redefining marriage in the public mind* that bodes ill for the common good. Indeed, societies mindful of this fact need deprive no same-sex attracted people of practical goods, social equality, or personal fulfillment.

Here then is the heart of our argument against redefinition. If the law defines marriage to include same-sex partners, many will come to misunderstand marriage. They will not see it as essentially comprehensive, or thus (among other things) as ordered to procreation and family life—but essentially an emotional union.
