SCRIPTURE: Luke 14:16-24 A Gracious Invitation

Those who have much take it for granted and those who have little often appreciate everything they receive. Thus after those who were originally invited reject the invitation to the banquet because they had better things to do, the master invites the poor, the crippled, the blind, and the lame. He invites the foreigners and sojourners on the highways and sleeping under the hedges. They hear the gracious invitation with joy and come. We pray that the Holy Spirit through the Holy Scriptures grants us faith to receive the invitation and teaches us to appreciate the invitation to be at Christ's banquet. *Lord, we thank You for the invitation. Help us to be faithful. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 119:9-16 Delighting in the Lord's Statutes

We are called to delight in the Word. "I will delight myself in Your statutes" (119:16). This is more than reading and studying, it has to do with our affections, our joy. Luther reminds us that the 3rd Commandment has us "gladly" hearing and learning the Word. There is a spiritual battle over our attention and affection, and the devil would have us delight in anything other than the Word of God. But this Word is God's mind made known, His kindness and love revealed. His Word gives us comfort and courage. It is a lamp and light in the dark, and a solid foundation when nothing seems solid at all. His Word is de-

lightful, and by the Holy Spirit, we'll catch on to that. *Lord, give us delight in Your Word. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: 1 John 3:13-18 Love is Passing from Death to Life

"We know that we have passed from death to life because we love the brethren." Love is life. Because of His great love for us, the Father sent His only begotten Son to die for us. Because of His great love for us, the Son gave His life as the propitiation for our sins. Because of His great love for us, the Holy Spirit comes to us with the promise of kindness and the strength of salvation. The love of God is our life. And this love of God for us spills over into our life of love for our neighbor. We love because He first loved us. We love because His love made us alive. *O Lord, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, make is alive with Your love. Amen.* WED

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 25:6-9 Fellowship through Feasting

Isaiah prophesies the end of incredible destruction and the enthronement of God for all to see, and His gracious provision for all nations in the abundance of the Gospel: chiefly, death will be undone. This is cause to rejoice for what had separated people from God, sin leading to death, is removed. Isaiah's prophecy is Messianic, for only the Divine Son's immaculate sacrifice could atone for the sin of men. So it is, that through the Son, we have fellowship and commune with God in body and blood, partaking of the feast of eternal life. And in this feast we look forward to its fullness at His glorious appearing: I will come to him and eat

with him and he with Me (Rev. 3:20). *Grant, Lord, that I now receive You, That I nevermore will leave You. Amen.*

SCRIPTURE: Luke 14:25-35 The First Mention of the Cross

In this text we have the first mention of the "cross" in the Gospels. And look, it's not the cross of Jesus. It's your cross. "Whoever does not bear his cross and come after Me cannot be My disciple." Jesus calls us to a life that will include suffering, a life of heartache and sorrow. We walk through a veil of tears. But the cross does not only mean sorrow, it also means forgiveness, life, and salvation. It also delivers from death and hell. The cross means that God is not our enemy, but our friend. So our crosses are a light load. Jesus carries the heavy stuff, the sin and death and sorrow, and we walk with Him, bearing the yoke

made light by His mercy. Lord Jesus, thank You for carrying my burdens of sin and death, and placing on me the joy of Your salvation. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Revelation 3:14-22 To the Church in Laodicea

Jesus dictates seven beautiful letters to the church, His beloved. In this final letter to the Laodiceans He stirs them up, disrupting the coldness of their pride. "We are rich; we need nothing." "No," says Jesus, "you are wretched, miserable, poor, blind, and naked." Jesus freezes them with the Law and then fires them up with the Gospel. "I cover the shame of your nakedness, I will give you sight. My treasures make you rich." This is the zeal of repentance, knowing the depth of our sin and the height of Jesus' love. May the Holy Spirit create the same in our hearts and congregations. *Heavenly Father, cover our shame, heal our poverty,*

forgive our sins, and give us eyes to see the life and joy You have won for us. Amen.

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 28 Our Strength and Our Shield

David prayed this psalm against his enemies, that the Lord Himself would be both his strength and his shield, when he was delivered from the threats of Saul, Absalom, and other enemies. Jesus prayed this psalm as "the saving refuge of His anointed" in the flesh, for He was anointed by the Father to be the eternal refuge of God's people. And you, in Christ alone, "pray this psalm against the tyrants and against the rebellious spirits . . . [who] seek the corruption of souls and are, under sheep's clothing, ravening wolves" (Luther). Let us conclude this week by praying the last verse of this Psalm, which is sung as part of the Te Deum ("We Praise Thee, O God"): *O Lord, save Thy people and bless Thine inheritance! Govern them and lift them up forever. Amen.*

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
