Around the Word Devotions + the week of November 23-29, 2025

THEME OF THE WEEK: The Second Coming of Christ

The second coming of Christ brings up many questions. We ask: When? How? Where? All these questions that rack our brains would be better left unanswered until that actual day that He returns. For what do these matter? And how many days can we add to our life worrying about them? Instead, let us fill our hearts with the promises of what we have in Christ, even right now. For the gifts of eternal life and salvation are ours right here and now, even as we wait for them in full. We shall look upon the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living, for

Christ is the Lamb of God Who takes away our sin and brings us into His heavenly wedding feast as our perfect Bridegroom.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 25:1-13 "Faith is Readiness"

Five wise and five foolish virgins. With this parable Jesus calls us to be among the wise, among the ready, among those who have oil in their lamps. What does this mean? What does it mean to be ready for the Lord's return? How can we be prepared for the Last Judgment? Keeping all the commandments? Accomplishing enough good? That will never do. Our only hope is in Christ, His mercy, His forgiveness, His suffering and death for our life and salvation. Faith is readiness. We long for the last day because we know that the One coming is the One Who came already, the One Who loved us, and still loves us. The bridegroom comes, awake! Amen. *Come, Lord Jesus. Amen.*

MON

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 103 "As Far as the East is from the West"

See in this Psalm how the Lord in His goodness has removed our sins from us "as far as the east is from the west" (v. 12). If you fly due north, for instance, you will eventually cross the North Pole and be going south and then north again, effectively in circles. But travel east or west and you are always going one exclusive direction. See how the East is as far from the West as two directions can possibly be from one another! "This all comes to pass in Christ, Who for this reason was promised and now is come, Whose kingdom reigns over all" (Luther), has removed our sins from us by His own blood. *Father in heaven, as the east and the west can never meet, so remove our sins far from us, that they can be counted against us no more. Amen.*

TUE

SCRIPTURE: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 "The Day of the Lord"

The unbelieving world, marked in this passage by spiritual darkness, sleepiness, and drunkenness will continue to think that the world will keep going as it has been. "Peace and safety!" they cry, when there is no peace apart from faith and no safety apart from Jesus. They are heading for destruction as the great day of the Lord comes upon them unawares. But the Christians, those who eagerly await the Lord's coming, continue to encourage one another and build each other up in faith. They put on the sober virtues of faith, hope, and love so as to meet their Lord who died for them, whether they wake or sleep. There they have peace and safety. *Lord Jesus, help us to put off the works of darkness and so meet You with joy when You come again. Amen.*

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WED

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 65:17-19 "New Heavens and Earth"

These heavens and earth are tired, old, and worn out. Like with a frayed and threadbare garment, we can see the world groaning in anticipation of renewal. Nature has been despoiled. The waters are tainted. The air is poisoned. Society is in shambles. Men no longer fear God nor know how to love their neighbors. Everything is subjected to futility. God be praised that He has delivered this great promise to us today. He comes to create a new heavens and earth and the old ways of sin and death will not even be remembered. Weeping and sorrow will cease. The Lord's joy and gladness in and for us will give us eternal life. Christ is coming soon, dear saints. Pray he comes quickly. *Grant me patience to wait for Your Son's coming, heavenly Father. Amen.*

THU

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 5:13-16 "Hide It Under a Bushel"

As light we shine in the darkness. We do this so that others may see our good works and give glory to God. And this is important, for even though God doesn't need our good works, our neighbor does. But Jesus here, in this "salty-lightness" talk, doesn't just mean handing out sandwiches and shoveling your neighbor's sidewalk. These should be done, but they can just as easily be done by an unbeliever. (And if truth be told, sometimes they are even done better by unbelievers.) No, here in the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus wants us to be a light of the Gospel. The good works that will cause our neighbor to give glory to God are the preaching and teaching of Christ crucified and the forgiveness of sins. In this proclamation, the whole world may rejoice. *Father, may we always be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. Amen.*

FRI

SCRIPTURE: Revelation 21:1-7 "Behold, I Am Making All Things New"

The dwelling place of God is indeed with man through the incarnation of Christ, the Son of God, Who came to take away the sin of the world. Since that time of His first coming, Jesus has remained with us whenever we hear His Word or receive His Sacraments. We can't see Him, but He is personally and fully present. When the last day comes, our eyes will catch up with our ears and hearts. We will see what we have long believed and hoped for. Don't be afraid. Don't fear the judgment. You have already passed from death to life in Baptism. Your name has been recorded in the Book of Life. You have been prepared together with the whole church to be the pure and beautiful Bride of Christ. *Grant me to always wait for Your coming, O Lord. Amen.*

SAT

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 27 "Wait"

David, speaking in the Holy Spirit, encourages the soul to "wait on the Lord, be of good courage, and He shall strengthen your heart: Wait, I say, on the Lord!" (vs. 14 NKJV). He is doubly emphatic – wait! He says this specifically because of our tendency to NOT wait and trust that the Lord will deliver on His promises. He says "He WILL strengthen your heart" which means that right now, his heart needs strengthening. This psalm is not pious self-talk or bravado "My heart will not fear..." but is godly encouragement to those who suffer the effects of sin in this life. It points us not to ourselves but to the Lord Who is mighty to save. For those who pray thus in faith, the Lord WILL strengthen him by His Spirit. *Lord, strengthen me by Your Word. Amen.*

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
